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#### GREAT HARVEST AND THANKSGIVING CRAFT IDEAS!

Path for Necklace

Crosses

#### AMBER AND GREEN CROSS

#### **Materials**

- 110" piece of natural hemp for knotting cord
- 2 60" pieces of hemp for filler cord
- © Five 1/2" Amber tube beads
- ① 1" Amber tube bead
- 3 Amber glass donut beads
- 1) Make the Upright. Begin at the bottom of the cross and work upward. Centre one Amber glass donut bead on two cords, one 60" and the 110' cord. Fold both cords in at the centre bead, then add a 1" Amber tube bead to all 4 cords.
- Center of the Cross: Add one Green bead to the two filler cords.
- 3) Arms of the Cross: Add one 1/2" Amber tube bead, and one Amber glass donut bead to one knotting cord. Thread the end of the cord back through the tube bead. Pull the cord to bring the arm up to cross. Repeat for the other arm.
- 4) Top of the Cross: Thread all cord ends up through a 1/2" Amber tube bead and a Green bead for the top of the cross. Pull cords to tighten and shape the cross.
- 5) Finish the Top: Tie 2 Square Knots. Tie the first half of a 3rd Square Knot, center the other 60" cord across the know. Tie the second half of the Square Knot.
- 6) Necklace: Separate the cords into 2 groups, with each group containing two filler cords and 2 knotting cords. Tie Square Knots for 2" then add an Amber tube bead to each side. Continue tying Square Knots for a total of 12" with each group.
- 7) At one end, tie 2 Overhand Knots, one on top of the other. On the other end of the necklace, tie an Overhand Knot leaving a 3/4" space for a loop. Trim the ends.

## LEAF STAINED GLASS

#### Materials

- 🙂 Waxed Paper, Leaves
- © Scissors, an Iron
- Old newspapers, a Tea Towel
- tear off two pieces of waxed paper a little larger than you want your finished stained glass to be.
- Lay one piece of waxed paper on top of several sections of old newspaper. Arrange the leaves on the waxed paper.
- 3) Put the second piece of waxed paper on top of the leaves. Cover with a tea towel.
- 4) With the iron set on "low", gently press the waxed paper sandwich. You'll see the pieces of waxed paper joining together. Keep moving the iron in circles until the whole top piece of paper is fused to the leaves & to the bottom paper.
- 5) Trim the edges of the waxed paper to make them straight.
- Hang your stained glass in a window using cellophane tape.



#### MORE GREAT HARVEST AND THANKSGIVING CRAFT IDEAS!

#### APPLE CANDLES

#### **BALLOON TURKEY**

#### **Materials**

- 🙂 apple corer
- Large delicious apples (or other apples that stand straight on the table)
- Candles
- Waxed paper
- © Potato peeler and lemon juice
- Stickers, paint, or autumn leaves

Using an apple corer, make a straight hole about halfway through the middle of an apple. Remove the core piece.

The candle should fit tightly into the hole; if the hole is too large, wrap waxed paper around the candle end.
Repeat for as many apples as you'd like.

Older kids can decorate apples by carving designs in the skins with the tip of a potato peeler (to prevent the designs from turning brown, rub them with lemon juice immediately).

For a base, use a plate or cutting board, or decorate a piece of aluminum foil with stickers, paint or leaves and place the apples in a circle on the foil.



#### Materials

- © 2 round red balloons
- 😊 🛮 1 oblong yellow balloon
- © Rubber band
- Cardboard
- Masking tape
- Acrylic paints and paintbrushes



For the turkey's body, blow up a red balloon and knot the end. To make the head, blow up the yellow balloon about halfway, so that there's an un-inflated "nose" at one end, then knot the balloon, Tie an un-inflated red balloon to the nose to make the turkey's wattle. Attach the knotted-off ends of the body and the head together by wrapping a rubber band around them. Cut the feet out of one piece of cardboard and attach them to the bottom of the turkey with masking tape.

Now your child can dress up her bird, painting on a face and feathers, After you make a few turkey balloons, your kids can hold a race to see who can bop theirs across the room first. The winner gets the real turkey's wishbone!

## IN THE KITCHEN - BAKING IDEAS

## SCRIPTURE CAKE

## CHALLAH (Braided Egg Loaf)

3/4 cup Genesis 18:8 (found in the first four words)

1 1/2 cup Jeremiah 6:20

5 Luke 11:12

3 c. Leviticus 24:5

3/4 tsp. 2 Kings 2:20

3 tsp. Amos 4:5

1 tsp. Exodus 30:23

1/4 tsp. each: 2 Chronicles 9:9

1/2 c. Judges 4:19 (last part)

1/2 c. Genesis 43:11 (last part of the verse only)

1/2 c. Jeremiah 24:5

1/2 c. 2 Samuel 16:1

Heat oven to 350 degrees F.

Thoroughly cream butter, brown sugar and eggs; combine dry ingredients and add alternately to creamed mixture with milk. Stir in nuts and fruit.

Bake in two oiled cake pans for 30 to 40 minutes.

NOTE: This is a real cake!

1 tablespoon yeast (15 ml)

2 tablespoons and 1 teaspoon sugar (20 ml)

1 1/2 cups lukewarm water (345 ml)

1/4 cup oil (60ml)

1 tablespoon salt (15 ml)

3 eggs

4-5 cups flour

(520-620 q)

1 egg white for glaze



Mix yeast in 1/2 cup of water in which the 1 teaspoon of sugar has been dissolved. Add remaining water, sugar, oil, salt, and eggs.

Mix in approximately 4-5 cups of flour, and knead until smooth and elastic. Place in a greased bowl.

Cover and allow to rise in a warm place until double in bulk (about 1 1/2 hours).

Divide the dough into 2 parts. Divide each part into 3 pieces, and roll each out to a length of 15". Braid the pieces together. Place one on top of the other and nip securely together. Place on a greased baking sheet. Cover and put in a warm place, allowing to double in size (about 1 hour).

Brush bread with egg white, and 2 tablespoons of water, and sprinkle with sesame or poppy seeds.

Bake at 400 degrees F for about 15 minutes.

Reduce heat to 375 degrees F, and continue cooking until golden and hollow when tapped — 30-35 minutes.

#### Who are we?

The Comfy Cozy Fund was conceived by a six year old boy, Jake, who was diagnosed with Leukemia in March 2003. He is still undergoing treatment and has frequented the Hospital hundreds of times. During his many hospital stays and visits, he has remarked that many of the children lacked even the most basic comforts of home to make their stays more bearable. He decided that he wanted to help make the hospital a more Comfy and Cozy environment for kids like him, who undergo chemotherapy.

## What is our objective?

Our fund strives to help provide children with a much-needed positive attitude towards their treatment. Research has proven that patients respond better when their morale is strong. Children on the oncology ward undergo arduous treatments and are sometimes not allowed to leave their rooms for days at a time. In many cases, their parents are not able to remain with them around the clock due to other responsibilities.

We want every child to look forward to their hospital stay. We want each room to have a cable T.V., a telephone, a Game Boy, books, a fresh pair of slippers, a toothbrush, board games, art supplies, ... etc. We want the children to look back at their treatments with a smile. We want them to be as comfortable as possible. We are working with parents and hospital staff to compile a wish list that would add an extra level of comfort to these children's lives.
