Flames of Discipleship: Gifts of the Holy Spirit

Here is an appealing way to help students reflect on the seven traditional gifts of the Holy Spirit as found at the beginning of Isaiah 11. Hand-sized "flames" depict the Spirit's gifts, imparted to us at baptism to help us live as followers of Christ. Each diecut flame is imprinted with brief text describing one of the following: Wisdom, Reverence, Knowledge, Fortitude, Counsel, Understanding and Fear of the Lord (Awe). Each flame also has a short prayer. Distribute one per student, or let them pick one or

more of the flames spread face-down on the table. Orders come with sermon notes and commentary on each of the gifts and some applications to everyday life.

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A FIERY SIGN


Tongues of fire appeared over the disciples' heads on the day of Pentecost, a sign of God's presence and power. Read about it in Acts 2.

GREAT SUMMER CRAFT IDEAS!


Flower Pounding—Make Pillows, Cards,

Materials: paper bags, hammer,

unbleached muslin cloth, butter knife,

fresh leaves and flowers, paper.

Cover a smooth, hard surface with paper bags and spread out the fabric. Arrange a leaf and flower design on one half of the fabric, then fold the other half over the design. Using a hammer, pound on top of the leaves or flowers, being sure to go all the way to the edges. When the colour has bled through the fabric, open it up and scrape off the plant residue with



the butter knife. You'll have a mirror image of the leaves and flowers. The fabric pieces make great pillow fronts or quilt squares, though they will fade after repeated washings (use cold water).

For an alternative to the mirror, image method, simply place the flowers on the fabric, cover with a sheet of waxed paper, and pound away. You can also use the same method to pound leaves and flowers onto paper to make floral stationery or gift tags.

Home Made PotPourri Throughout history, fragrant flowers and herbs have been mixed together to freshen the air and add a little spice to life. Here's how your kids can custom-mix a colourful blend of potpourri to use in their rooms or to give as a gift.

When a bouquet starts to fade, remove the petals and spread them out to dry.

Later, place them in a bowl or basket, For extra colour and texture, blend in natural objects, such as bark, pine needles, or sea shells. Or liven up the mixture by adding cinnamon sticks and citrus peels, dried rosemary or basil, or even a quick spray of your favourite perfume

Candle Supplies

Paraffin wax is available at almost all grocery stores. The other materials needed are available at most candle-making stores or from one of these mail-order sources. General Wax & Candle Company sells sheets of honeycomb beeswax, wax dyes, and wicking: call 1-800-WAX-STORE for a catalogue. Yankee Candle Company (1-800-243-1776) sells paraffin, wax dyes, and wicking. Or try any craft store in Montreal.

Sand Candles

If your kids bring home enough sand after a day at the beach to build another beach, here's a great use for it. You need

- Large heat-proof mixing bowl
- Sand, enough to fill the bowl
- Wicking
- Thin wood dowel or stick
- Coffee can of melted paraffin—melt it in a pot of hot water, AN ADULT MUST HELP! And never leave it unattended.
- Pliers

Fill the bowl 3/4 full with slightly damp sand and ask your child to dig a mold the size of his fist. Using your hands, bend one side of the empty coffee can rim to form a spout. Fill the can halfway with paraffin and melt; when the wax has melted, turn off the heat. Cut the wicking to 6-8 inches longer than your mold is deep. Rest the dowel across the bowl's top and tie one end of the wick around it. Press the other end into the bottom of the mold. Now, pour the wax (adult only) into the mold until it reaches about 1 inch from the top. When the candle is cool, remove it from the mold, brush off the excess sand, and trim the wick.

Holy Spirit Come ... A Pentecost Drama

Check on accompanying instruments. Lights down, bare stage. Lights at crossing, and the drama begins....

Enter Liturgical Dancers. Dance "Refiner's Fire".

Dancers lead in **Disciples** (Choir) who group on platform, steps and in chancel. Following the dance, the dancers weave in and out of the disciples with fabric "fire" and then the dancers leave to Narthex (Narthex= the back of the church)

As dancers leave, **Reader #1** takes place at standing microphone and begins:

Reader #1: Acts 2:v1-4

"When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them."

As the Reader pauses, the Believers begin to speak in different languages. They continue miming during dialogue. Enter people of Jerusalem from Narthex.

Reader #1: Acts 2:v5-7

"Now there were staying in Jerusalem God-fearing Jews from every nation under heaven. When they heard this sound, a crowd came together in bewilderment, because each one hears them speaking in his own language. Utterly amazed, they asked "Are not all these men who are speaking Galileans?"

Person: "These people who are talking like this.....

Several other people speak, continuing v8-11

"Then how is it that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthia, Medes, and Elamites; residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphyi, Egypt and the parts of Libya near Cyrene; visitors from Rome (both Jews and converts to Judiaism); Cretans and Arabs—we hear them declaring the wonders of God in our own tongues!"

Reader #1: v12-13

"Amazed and perplexed they asked one another, "What does this mean?" Some, however, made fun of them and said, "They have had too much wine".

All actors freeze.

Modern Person #1 enters and speaks to congregation.

Modern Person #1: What kind of scripture reading is this? They all seem to be crazy. I suppose this kind of thing could have happened in ancient times but why are you acting it out today? I don't see how this weird stuff relates to my life.

Modern Person #2 comes forward from the congregation.

Modern Person #2: Actually that's not true, some of these works of the Spirit are happening in our times. That's why we're here to learn more about all of this. Why don't you come and sit down and we'll watch it together?

Music: "Holy Spirit Come" by the Disciples.

The **Disciples** become the **Choir**. They group seated on platform, steps and in chapel. While music plays, the **disciples** mime together on the platform, **people** of Jerusalem argue and point at the disciples, shake their heads, etc. **Peter** then comes forward to address them (and the congregation):

Peter: v 14-15

"Fellow Jews and all of you who are in Jerusalem, let me explain this to you; listen carefully to what I say. These men are not drunk, as you suppose. It's only nine in the morning!"

Reader #2: A reading from the prophet Joel

"In the last days, God says, I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your young men will see visions, your old men will dream dreams. Even on my servants, both men and women, I will pour out my Spirit in those days, and they will prophesy. I will show wonders in the heaven above and signs on the

Holy Spirit, Come (continued)

earth below, blood and fire and billows of smoke. The sun will be turned to darkness and the moon to blood before the coming of the great and glorious day of the Lord. And everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.

Modern Person #1 to Peter: I didn't know that there were any messages about the Holy Spirit in the Old Testament.

Peter to congregation and people: - v22-24

"People of Israel, listen to this: Jesus of Nazareth was a man accredited by God to you by miracles, wonders and signs, which God did among you through him as you yourselves know. This man was handed over to you by God's set purpose and foreknowledge; and you, with the help of wicked men, put him to death by nailing him to the cross. But God raised him from the dead, freeing him from the agony of death, because it was impossible for death to keep its hold on him.

Reader #3: David said about him:

will fill me with joy in your presence."

Music: "All Consuming Fire" - Choir/Disciples

Peter (again): King David was another great prophet. He spoke about the resurrection of Jesus when he said:

Reader #3: "He was not abandoned ..."

Peter: "God has raised this Jesus to life, and we are all witnesses of the fact. Exalted to the right hand of God, he has received from the Father the promised Holy Spirit and has poured out what you now see and hear."

Going Solo An article from Christian Parenting Today, Spring 2004 Issue

In my experience, 12 year-old boys are the quietest creatures on the planet. It's strange how they turn from bubbling and blabbering 9- and 10-year olds to silent teenagers. Still, there are plenty of great ways to stay close to your son as he enters this new stage of life:

Get active. Boys are typically doers more than talkers. Think of a sport, game, or hobby that the two of you can do together, perhaps with another mother and son. Plan a regular "date" with your son and give him some input on what you can do together. How about skiing or sledding? Read a book together (The Lord of the Rings series is a great one for boys) and discuss it over pizza. Cook a meal, plant a garden, ride bikes—whatever gets the two of you used to being together as friends as well as mother and son.

Use technology. As strange as it sounds, some parents of teens keep in touch with them through email or via instant messages (IMs). If you work outside the home, IM your son when you know he'll be online after school. Send him an e-mail to let him know you're excited to see him when you get home. Even if you're there when he gets the message, he'll know you've been thinking of him.

Check in every day. One way or another make the time to ask how his day went, share highlights about yours, and follow up on his activities and friends.

Create a hangout. The more you can be the host place for his friends, the more you'll know about his friends, his interests, and his life. Meet the girls in his life. Young teen girls are much more talkative than their male counterparts, so you'll get more insight into his life from his female buddies than you're likely to get from him.

Find him a mentor. Ask your son to help you think of a trusted Christian man with whom he has a natural connection who can act as a kind of "big Brother". Have this guy over for meals, invite him to your son's activities, and encourage the two of them to spend time together. Check in with your son periodically to make sure he continues to feel good

about this relationship. Not only will your son benefit from this friendship, but you'll have another adult who can offer a perspective on your child.

Single parenting is no picnic, but with a little extra effort on your part, you and your son can forge the special bond that will sustain both of you through the ups and downs of the teenage years and beyond.

Another Great Kidstuff Workshop ... contributed by Lydia Erwig-Straghan

Kidstuff continued its vital role in developing and enhancing children's ministry with another great workshop. 22 Christian educators were on hand Saturday February 21st to hear insights on effective Christian education ministry from Destiny Ministries' Brian Barr. With over 20 years of experience in youth and children's ministry and education, Rev. Barr combined practical advice alongside the latest stimulating curriculum resources from Group Publishing.

REAL Learning

Barr summarized Group's principles of authentic Christian education using the acrostic R.E.A.L. Learning is Relational as children learn best in interaction with others (i.e. in group work, partner work). It is also important for instructors to develop and build relationships with kids and thereby model the Christian lifestyle and values. "How can kids have a relationship with Christ if there is no relationship with you?", asked Barr, highlighting the need for good Christian role models. The E in REAL stands for experiential; everyone is involved in learning when it is handson. Kids also require their lessons to be Applicable, the third principle of REAL. Teachers need to make their lessons real by finding ways for students to apply the learning to their lives. This is in direct contrast to the one-size-fits-all lessons of yesteryear, where students passively learned facts and stories having no bearing on their everyday life. According to Rev. Barr, the North American church has been "preached into passivity" instead of being taught life-applicable truths of the Bible. The teachings of Christ often stay passively inside the church door and are not taken actively out into the word. Making the message applicable to people's lives makes the connection between hearing and doing.

Creating life applicable lessons requires an understanding of where students are at, so lessons must be **Learner**-based. Good lesson

planning is customized to the learner and must stem from the learners' own experience. Teachers should prepare as a student, casting themselves in the learners' role rather than as a teacher. In this way the teacher can better anticipate the needs of the learners and therefore plan a more effective class.

Teaching is a Job for Two People!

After outlining the elements of REAL learning, Rev. Barr gave several demonstrations of object lessons and games that imparted Biblical truths combined with play and learning about the Lord. He noted that in preparing and teaching lessons, instructors often forget that it is a job for 2 people, the teacher and the Holy Spirit working in tandem. No matter how great the resources or how cool the lesson plan, all good teaching starts with the prayer, asking God to fill us with the Spirit to teach effectively, then all the rest follows.

Volunteers - the Endangered Species!

Teaching is a challenge; however it is an even greater challenge to find volunteers to do so! Rev. Barr had many helpful suggestions towards capturing 'the most endangered species: volunteers.' Normally when recruiting volunteers the people being asked have no clue what is involved and this leads to a lackluster attitude towards children's ministry. Barr noted that while most churches have a mission statement for their ministry, church schools almost never do. The mission of the church school and youth group may overlap with the church's, but they are not the same thing and have some different goals involved. A church school or youth group mission statement is a great way to inspire volunteers and can also give people a better idea what is involved in a volunteer commitment. The mission statement should incorporate key ministry elements and goals along with a leadership profile that outlines expectations of leaders. Barr counsels against the

"warm body syndrome" of Christian education, the idea that anyone alive and willing will do. Children and youth ministry require people who have a heart children? Hopefully the very best of the church. Christian education provides education, not babysitting, and thus requires more of its volunteers than a passive presence.

Five Easy Steps to Volunteer Recruitment

Barr outlined some easy steps to volunteer recruitment that keeps the focus the special nature of children's ministry:

- 1. When inviting someone to join the education team, ask them to pray about the opportunity to minister to children or youth.
- 2. Give a deadline of when you will get back to them, and make sure you keep it. This gives people time to pray and consider and no one is put on the spot.
- 3. Call and ask how God has been leading them and remember that God is your recruiter.
- 4. Explore what ministry appeals to them and if they say yes to volunteering help them serve where their strengths are.
- 5. The last step is to bless the person with a thank you letter if they say no. Barr notes that whenever someone spends time praying about your ministry that, is something to say thanks for. This also avoids what he termed the "hall dodger syndrome", where the people who said No avoid you in the hall.

This method of volunteer recruitment is very intentional and is indicative of an organized and clearly envisioned children's ministry. If Christian education happens without a purpose, what reason would there be for anyone to do it as a ministry? Barr encourages us to examine our programs and ask ourselves the crucial questions: What do we want for our children, parents, and volunteers? What do we believe about the relationship between

God and children? What do we believe about the relationship and responsibility of the church to the children?

Hopefully, we came away with a few answers to these questions, and the tools Rev. Barr gave us will help as we work out the rest! Many thanks to Rev. Barr for sharing his knowledge in such a practical and fun way, and also thanks to Valerie Taylor who organized another successful Kidstuff event!
